The end of the year, the silly season. It has been a very busy year for us here. It started off wet, then Kirra and I had a car accident, then Covid, then it got much wetter, in fact 300 ml in one night. Drug shortages. Fertiliser prices skyrocketed. Then we had FMD on our doorstep causing heightened biosecurity concerns. As a dairy farmer said to me this week, it's a lifestyle choice!

The wet weather meant this year we saw stomach fluke cases like never before, as in adults as well as calves were affected.

Nilzan became impossible to find.

Salmonella was seen in dairy herds, and we had two herds with strep ag. Probably all related to wet weather. Theileria was

widespread and we had a case of bracken toxicity.

On the plus side we had great cattle prices and record breaking bull sales. What a year.

The highs have been helping clients to achieve good results in bull production, ETs, pregnancies and profitability. The lows have been a few bad calvings and one really awful prolapse.

This month I had a first in 35 years. I was ET flushing a cow that has had two calves. I placed the catheter in the left horn, no problem to flush. But then I couldn't redirect the catheter into the right horn. After 30 mins of frustration I decided to go back to the beginning and manually examine her. She has two separate cervixes, each with its own horn and ovary. I then flushed her right horn. It's called uterine didelphys and unfortunately it's genetic.

And in the Horses.....

In the horses this wet year we had lots of foot abscesses and several cases of Ross River Fever. We also saw Big Head and lamenesses in horses on setaria paddocks. I hate setaria.

Other odd things this year included removing a giant penis bean, a Giant Cell tumour removal surgery, a lactating mare due to Cushings disease, Crofton weed toxicity, Shipping Fever pleurisy and scanning triplets.

The highs have included foalings and seeing Al pregnancies right through. The lows have been some colics.

This month I saw a horse with a slightly bloody and mucoid nasal discharge from one nostril. It was not responsive to antibiotics so I scoped it to find an ethmoidal haematoma - which is a type of tumour. There are some treatment options but we decided against them.
